



YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN WISCONSIN

Election Day: **Tuesday, November 5, 2024**
Polls Will Be Open 7 A.M. to 8 P.M.



Who Can Vote?

- You can vote if you are a U.S. citizen, are at least 18 years old, have lived at your address for at least 28 days before the election, are not serving any portion of a felony sentence, and are registered.
- Here is how you can register to vote:
 - **By mail** postmarked by **October 16** to your municipal clerk. Find your municipal clerk's information here: <https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/My-Municipal-Clerk>
 - **Online** by **October 16** here: <https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/Register-To-Vote>
 - **In person** at your municipal clerk's office by 5 p.m. **November 1**.
 - **In person** at your local polling place on **Election Day, November 5**.
- Proof of residence is required when registering to vote. Examples of proof of residence can be found here: <https://elections.wi.gov/Register#230548828-870893236>

Do I need to show ID to vote?

- **Yes.** You must show a Wisconsin driver's license or ID card, military ID, U.S. passport or passport card, an ID card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin, a Wisconsin college photo ID that has an expiration date and student signature (if expired, must provide additional proof of enrollment), or one of the following unexpired photo IDs: certificate of naturalization (issued within the last 2 years), a recent driving or ID card receipt from Wisconsin DOT, or Veteran Affairs ID card.

- If you don't have your ID you are allowed to vote with a provisional ballot.

Can I vote by *mail*?

- **Yes.** You can apply to vote-by-mail if you are registered to vote. No excuse is required, but your application must include a copy of your acceptable ID.

When and where do I vote *in-person*?

- The polls are open **7 a.m. to 8 p.m.** on **Election Day, November 5**. You can find your polling place and view your sample ballot online at: <https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/Find-My-Polling-Place>
- The dates and hours for **early voting** are set by the municipal clerk. Contact your municipal clerk for more information here: <https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/My-Municipal-Clerk>

Can I receive assistance or a ballot in Spanish?

- **Yes.** If you need assistance with voting because you don't speak English or have a disability, you can bring a person into the voting booth to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want except your employer, your union representative, or any of their agents. The person you bring does not need to be a registered voter.
- You have the right to a Spanish ballot and help in Spanish if you live in **Abbotsford, Curtiss, Arcadia, Milwaukee, Sharon, and West Milwaukee**.
